Success Story: Health & Safety Homework

Recently a Ministry of Labour colleague shared a story about health and safety education and his personal experience as a parent. On the first day of Grade 9, his son Paul was assigned health and safety homework in science class. Emergency procedures and lab safety were discussed, and a WHMIS worksheet was given to the students to research and complete.

While guidance may be needed to direct students to the right resources in completing the homework, it shows, at a formative and memorable time in the life of a high school student, that health and safety is a top priority. This presents an opportunity for parental discussion, and allows teachers to show the importance of safety, whether in the science lab or on the job.


